Title of Lesson: Temple Tunnel Book

Time: 5 - 70 minute periods

Lesson Plan Description:

An interdisciplinary art and history lesson that introduces students to Greek architecture and religion while they create a Tunnel Book based on a Greek Temple. Students may choose a Greek god or goddess to occupy their temple or choose someone they admire (a hero, politician, athlete, rock star, etc.). The exterior of the temple (pediment and metopes) should be decorated with symbols related to their subject.

Previous Lessons:

Students have previously studied themes in sculpture, painting and architecture which explore both ceremonial and tomb architecture.

Essential Question:

What is a Greek temple and how have these buildings influenced our idea of architecture?

Project Objectives:

- To understand the origin of temple forms
- To understand the origins of humanism
- To understand how humanism manifests itself in the heroes and gods portrayed in Greek sculpture
- To identify the main architectural elements in a Greek temple
- To identify examples of contemporary architecture and sculpture which have been influenced by Greek culture

Materials:

1. Tunnel Book Templates: 4 main templates, 1 cult statue template, 1 blank template (65# Bright White Card Stock works well).
2. Two accordion folded spines and eight inner spines
3. X-acto knife/retractable knife and cutting surface, colored pencils and markers, Ultra Fine Sharpie, scissors/glue sticks

Sequence:

1. PowerPoint Presentation: The Greek Temple
2. Greek Temple Diagram: Handout and Worksheet
3. Greek Column Order Diagram
4. Discussion: Heroes of the Ancient World/Hero's Today?
5. Writing Assignment: Who are your heroes?
After choosing a hero/heroine to be represented as a cult statue in their temple, students should describe this person and explain their reasons for choosing this individual.
6. Tunnel Book Blueprint: Plotting out each tunnel book layer.
7. Cut out tunnel book layers
8. Decoration/Illustration of tunnel book layers
9. Gluing of tunnel book pieces and final construction
10. Add written description and explanation of hero on back of tunnel book
